## Today's Bible Readings Mark 1:4-11

John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River. John wore clothing made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. And this was his message: "After me comes the one more powerful than I, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." At that time Jesus came from Nazareth in Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. Just as Jesus was coming up out of the water, he saw heaven being torn open and the Spirit descending on him like a dove. And a voice came from heaven: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."

#### Acts 19:1-7

While Apollos was at Corinth, Paul took the road through the interior and arrived at Ephesus. There he found some disciples and asked them, "Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?"

They answered, "No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit."
So Paul asked, "Then what baptism did you receive?"

"John's baptism," they replied.
Paul said, "John's baptism was a baptism of repentance. He told the people to believe in the one coming after him, that is, in Jesus." On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul placed his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came on them, and they spoke in tongues

and prophesied. There were about twelve men in all.

#### Time to Reflect

With Christmas over and yet another lockdown beginning this may be the time to find a good book to read. Maybe we can catch up with the books which we've always wanted to read but never got round to.

Some books are particularly gripping, it's hard to put them down and we find ourselves moving from chapter to chapter very quickly. I remember when the last "Harry Potter" book came out, like many other people I was eager to see how the story ended. I have to admit that I cheated and read the last chapter first (just to find out if Harry survived), but then I 'binge read' the book, reading the whole 607 pages in just a few days. It was gripping and each chapter seemed more exciting than the last.

At this time of year the story of Jesus moves from chapter to chapter very quickly. Having just celebrated the nativity and then welcomed the Magi at Epiphany last Wednesday we already find Jesus as a fully grown man about to enter into his ministry. John has been preaching in the desert and is baptising in the Jordan, calling people to turn back to God (to "repent"), to confess their sins and to be cleansed and healed in the water of baptism. John's preaching appears in all four Gospels, although the baptism of Jesus only appears in the first three and, as is often the case, Mark's Gospel gives little detail about the encounter between John and Jesus. But what we do know is that Jesus, despite being without sin, received the same baptism offered to all. Right at the beginning of his ministry Jesus identified as one with the ordinary people. Holy God but wholly human. If we are to be like God we need to turn to him, confess our sins, receive a baptism of cleansing and healing. "Be still for the power of the Lord is moving in this place. He comes to cleanse and heal and minister his grace." That cleansing and healing is offered to all who believe in him and is constantly being renewed. Will you commit yourself again to owning that baptism for yourself?

But the story doesn't end there. There is an even more exciting "next chapter" to come. When Jesus comes out of the water there is a voice from heaven and the Holy Spirit rests on him like a dove, gentle but powerful. There is another baptism to come. As John prophesied "I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." The believers at Ephesus had received John's baptism of repentance, but God had much more planned. When Paul baptised them in the name of Jesus they received a new baptism – the baptism of the Holy Spirit and were filled with a new power.

Too many Christians today put down the book before getting to that exciting next chapter. Content with where they are, knowing God's love and forgiveness but failing to know the true power that comes through the baptism of the Holy Spirit.

But we don't have to stop there. Maybe today is the day for you to turn the page and to receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit for yourself. To say "loving God I know that I'm a forgiven sinner, cleansed and healed by you. But I know that you have more to offer me. Baptise me now with your Holy Spirit." It may be time for you to begin to experience an exciting new chapter in your journey with God. God's spirit is "unseen as the wind and gentle as a dove". Will you open yourself up to being baptised by that spirit?
