Alleluia! This is the Gospel of Christ. **Praise to Christ our Lord. Alleluia!** 

#### Reflection: The Resurrection of Jesus Christ

This familiar passage recounts the joy and mystery of the first Easter morning. It happens at a time of great uncertainty for the followers of Jesus, with their teacher dead the disciples must have felt adrift. In their grief, three visit Jesus' tomb and find him gone. Two leave, believing the body has been taken, but Mary Magdalene stayed behind.

This Easter story is the manifestation of God's plan for redemption of all of humanity as was prophesied through the ages for example, **Isaiah 26:19** and **Acts 24:15.** What the Easter story needed was a witness to evangelise the 'Good News' that **Jesus Christ** *is risen indeed!* 

To be a witness to the 'Good News' one has to be committed to Jesus Christ and be spiritually matured to handle the mysteries of the faith. Mary Magdalene was committed to Jesus – she was equally devoted just like the other disciples. Such dedication and love instilled in her a deeper sense of servitude to Jesus even in His death.

Little wonder that Mary Magdalene was the first to visit Jesus' tomb early in the morning whilst it was still dark to anoint his body and found the stone used to seal the tomb has been rolled away and she was shocked and distraught – thinking His body has been stolen.

# Question: Have you been shocked or confused over a situation and how did you deal with it?

Mary Magdalene worried Jesus' body had been stolen, ran to Simon Peter and as the scripture says and 'the other one whom Jesus loved' inviting them to come and confirm she was not imagining things. They rushed to the tomb and even though the other disciple outran Simon Peter and arrived at the tomb ahead of Simon Peter, yet he did not go into the tomb; he only looked in and saw the linen wrappings.

#### **Eyewitness Accounts**

Simon Peter, arriving later, went straight into the tomb and what he saw was quite different! He saw the linen wrapping and separated from it, was the cloth used to wrap Jesus' head. Simon Peter had a fuller understanding about the enormity of what they were witnessing as he carried Jesus' prophecy to be the foundation of Jesus' Church. This led the other disciple to go into the tomb to witness the fulfilment of the scriptures that – 'Jesus must rise from the dead'; and then the disciples returned to their homes.

The hymn 'O Love That Will Not Let Me Go'(StF-636) comes to mind. Whilst the disciples returned to their homes, Mary Magdalene consumed in grief stayed behind weeping, longing and yearning for Jesus. Looking in the tomb again, she saw two angels sitting at the head and foot positions of where Jesus' body was laid. She engaged in a dialogue with the angels, persisting on enquire about the whereabouts of Jesus' body. It was at this point that Jesus revealed Himself to Mary asking "woman, why are you

weeping? For whom are you weeping?" Mary at first mistook Jesus for the gardeneragain insisting on knowing the whereabouts of Jesus' body but when Jesus called out her name - "Mary!" Mary immediately recognised Jesus and called Him in her familiar terms - "Rabbouni"! (Teacher). This was a divine encounter for the purpose of a divine revelation!

### The Joy of Easter

Jesus commissioned Mary Magdalene with the Good News of the joy of Easter. It was important for Jesus' disciples and the world to know that death had no hold on Him and His ascension to His Father was certain. Mary went about announcing to the disciples that she had seen the Lord and told them everything Jesus has told her.

The joy of Easter is the belief that after three days, Jesus rose from the dead that is why Jesus warned Mary Magdalene not to hold on to Him but to release Him as He is yet to be ascended to His Father. Jesus Christ however appointed Mary Magdalene Evangelist and disciple – a true Believer - "my Father and your Father, My God, and your God" (Vs 17).

Easter is one of the times during the year when, through our church communities, we have an opportunity to reach out to many people. It is a touching point between the secular (social, commercial) and sacred worlds. It offers a chance to step into the Easter story, and to explore the truth of this wonderful mystery that is at the very heart of the Christian story.

Easter joy for an Easter people in a world full tribulation! A year one in a global pandemic, death and illness, loneliness, unemployment, mental illness is more prevalent amongst young people, racial, sexual and other forms of abuse and discriminations; the Church reimagining her identity and purpose going forward.

## **Good News**

**Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!** Jesus Christ has paid the ultimate price with His life so that we become new creation through Him and be reconciled to God our heavenly Father. Death and Sin has no hold over us; guilt and shame are condemned by His blood and the enemy is put to flight at the mention of His name.

The resurrected Christ brings us hope in times of despair. His birth, life, death and resurrection are blessed assurance that the battle is fought and won, and we are not alone. The Spirit of the Lord is with us, weeping with us, rejoicing with us, guiding us to Himself saying 'come unto me all who labour, and I will give you rest'. (Matthew 11:28)

The Prophet Isaiah draws a distinction between those who gave refuge to the poor and needy, and those who were ruthless (vv.4-5). For the former (the poor and needy included) there will be an opportunity to embrace a new life, portrayed as a great banquet. Grief will be a thing of the past: God will wipe away every tear (Revelation 21.4).

Finally, beloved, this day, 'if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come, the old has gone, the new is here! (2 Cors 5:17). Alleluia, for a new beginning concerning all things in heaven and on earth through Jesus Christ. Amen.
